WORLD WETLANDS DAY 2023: RESTORING WETLANDS

Back in 1971 several nations, including South Africa, concerned about the alarming state of wetlands, met in Ramsar, a city in Iran. They drafted the Convention on Wetlands (also referred to as the Ramsar Convention) which finally came into force in 1975. In the same year, South Africa registered the first two Ramsar wetland sites of international importance, namely De Hoop Vlei in the Western Cape and Baberspan in North West Province. They were followed by four more in 1986 and today we have a total of 28 Ramsar sites.

The Ramsar Convention's definition of wetlands is really broad and includes all lakes and rivers, underground aquifers, swamps and marshes, wet grasslands, peatlands, oases, estuaries, deltas and tidal flats, mangroves and other coastal areas, coral reefs, and all human-made sites such as fish ponds, rice paddies, reservoirs and salt pans". That covers just about every wet place on earth except the oceans!

179 countries currently subscribe to the Ramsar Convention and 2,471 sites have been registered across the world. The Convention encourages prudent use of wetlands, listing wetlands with

Ramsar to ensure that they are wisely managed, and international co-operation for transnational wetlands.

Wetland ecosystems play an important role in preserving our environment. Among others they purify water systems, preserve biodiversity, control flooding, recharge groundwater and counter climate change. Sadly, wetland areas and their quality continue to decline throughout the world. It is estimated that since the 1700s 90% of the world's wetlands have disappeared.

Some of the most threatened wetlands are those in or near urban areas where development causes severe damage and even destruction. In Gauteng only one wetland is listed with Ramsar, namely Blesbokspruit near Springs on the East Rand. Not originally a natural wetland, it formed as the result of road and embankment construction in 1930. Blesbokspruit was registered with Ramsar in 1996 to protect it after serious contamination by polluted water from adjacent mines.

South Africa is a water scarce country. We need to treasure our wetlands that act as sponges and assist in purifying contaminated water to flow out as clear streams. In urban areas wetlands also provide access to nature and recreation. Ramsar regards them as being sufficiently important to state that 'Urban wetlands make cities liveable'.

Although World Wetlands Day has been on the calendar since 1997 to promote wetlands, only last year was the second day in February officially named World Wetland Day by the United Nations.

This year the theme for World Wetlands Day is "Restoring Wetlands". Here at ORV, we are making our own contribution, even if small on a national scale, to restore the silted up dam area which evolved into a wetland after the weir breached in 2012. If you want to look at the area yourself, join the Wetland Working Committee on Thursday 2 February to listen to a talk on wetland birds under the trees opposite the small gate next to the jungle gym. THE FIGHT AGAINST ALIEN INVADERS

Invader plants are often very pretty, and many were brought into the country as garden plants.

Examples of such plants are the Bugweed and Yellow Flag Iris, both introduced in this way. Having no natural enemies here to keep them under control, these alien plants spread rapidly and then start to push out our own indigenous vegetation, reducing the biodiversity as they do. This problem is so serious that the Biodiversity Act (No 10 of 2004) makes provision for hefty fines where some of these plants are not removed or controlled, especially those in Category 1b of which a number grow in our wetland area.

One of the first steps in the rehabilitation of the ORV wetland area is to remove the alien invaders so that we can revegetate the area with plants endemic to this site. We are currently using several methods to get rid of invasives as the photos illustrate.

In 2018 more than forty large Eucalyptus trees were cut down along the northern galvanized fence in compliance with the permission to fence the area and at no cost to the village. These Australian trees have adapted to dry conditions in their natural habitat and their deep roots suck up an enormous amount of water. Since they were cut down, the former dam area is visibly wetter than before.

Bugweed can grow into quite large shrubs. These have all been cut down and the stumps poisoned to prevent regrowth. Some other small alien trees have been eradicated in the same manner.

Willow trees are aliens originally from China and they cause problems in some important wetlands such as Seekoievlei near Memel. For now, we will leave them to provide shade. The ones that have toppled

over will be trimmed but largely also left in place as is. The Spanish Reed is controlled by regularly cutting new growth. Eventually the roots of the reeds are exhausted by repeatedly having to support the new growth and they die off. Understandably, this is a slow process and can take some time, but it is an environmentally - friendly method. The Spanish Reed is not popular with the weaver birds - they much prefer to nest in the indigenous fluitjiesriet that grows near the dam embankment. Those reeds will be contained once the area floods when the weir is repaired as they do not grow in water deeper than 1.5 meters. Interestingly the lowest point in the dam area is not at the weir but in the southeast corner nearest to the village.

A large area has been cleared of the Yellow Flag Irises by cutting off the leaves and pulling up the rhizomes as far as possible. The regrowth will need to be controlled - as if even one piece of rhizome is left in the ground, it will simply grow again.

Last year some twenty black bags of Morning Glories were removed along the fence, mostly before they seeded. So far, these annuals have not come back with the same vengeance this year.

A recent invader is the Spider Wort which we first noticed last summer. It is an aggressive invader across the world. It belongs to the same family as the well-known Wandering Jew ground cover, which is not invasive. Large patches of these plants were removed, but within one season it covered an extensive area on the southern part of the former dam. It also grows back very quickly, and we are currently investigating whether poisoning may not be a last resort.

Two huge clumps of South American Pampas Grass grew in the wetland. These were cut down and the stumps removed by controlled burning,

which successfully prevented regrowth. The South American Pampas Grass was at one time planted on revegetated slimes dams all over the Witwatersrand to stabilise the slopes.

The above information gives an idea of the enormous task that it is to rehabilitate the dam area. There are many more invader plants present but we tackle them in the same way as one eats an elephant, one bite at a time :)

Fresh Strawberry Crisp

This Fresh Strawberry Crisp is the best summer dessert ever! Fresh juicy strawberries are topped with a buttery and crumbly oat topping, and is absolutely swoothworthy with a big scoop of vanilla ice cream on top!

Prep Time 10 mins

Cook Time 35 mins

Total Time 45 mins

Servings 8

Ingredients

5 heaped cups (5X 250ml) fresh strawberries, hulled and quartered
62,5ml granulated white sugar
5ml vanilla extract
3X 15ml corn starch

Topping

250ml all purpose flour
3X 60ml cup old fashioned oats

80ml cup granulated white sugar

80ml cup packed brown sugar

1/2 teaspoon salt

3/4X 5ml teaspoon cinnamon

125ml cup butter, melted

Instructions

- Preheat oven to 175 °C. Grease a deep-dish pie plate or large baking dish with butter or cooking spray and set aside.
- Combine the chopped strawberries and sugar in a large bowl and mix until the strawberries fully absorb the sugar. Add in the corn starch and vanilla extract and stir until all the strawberries are evenly coated. Pour into the prepared baking dish.
- In a separate medium size bowl, combine the flour, oats, brown sugar, granulated sugar, salt, and cinnamon. Pour in the melted butter and stir well until well coated and crumbly. Sprinkle the crumb mixture evenly over the top of the strawberries.

Bake in the preheated oven for 35-40 minutes until fruit is bubbly and topping is golden brown. Allow to cool slightly before serving. Serve warm with vanilla ice cream on top.

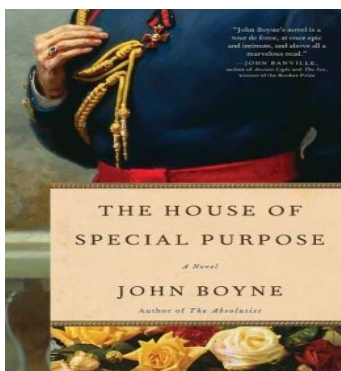
BOOK REVIEW

Not a new release but one by a favourite author.

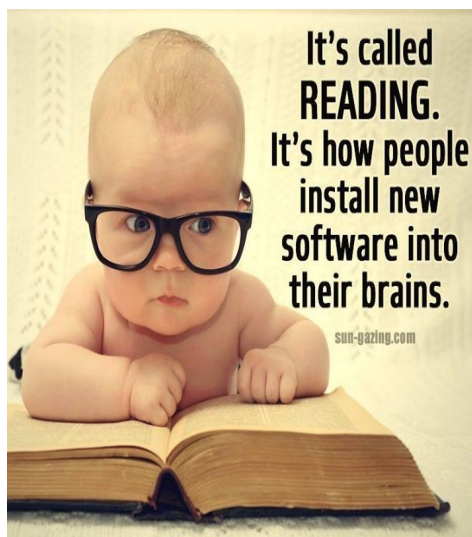
A interesting story of life in Russia for the peasants and the huge contrasts to the life of the Tsar and the ruling Romanovs in the early 1900'

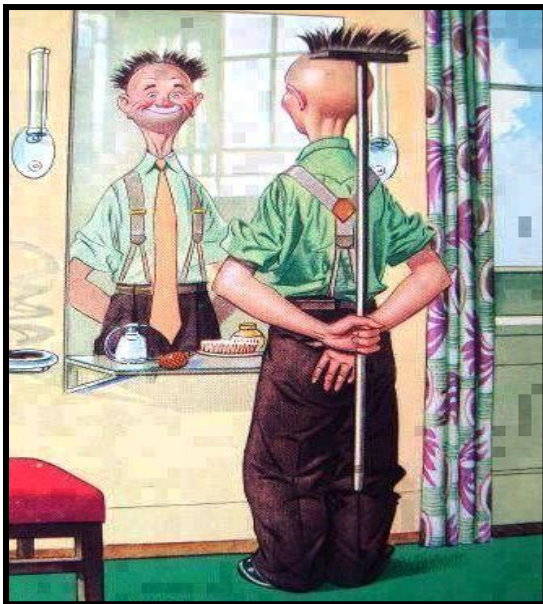

Let's hope that this little chick survives.

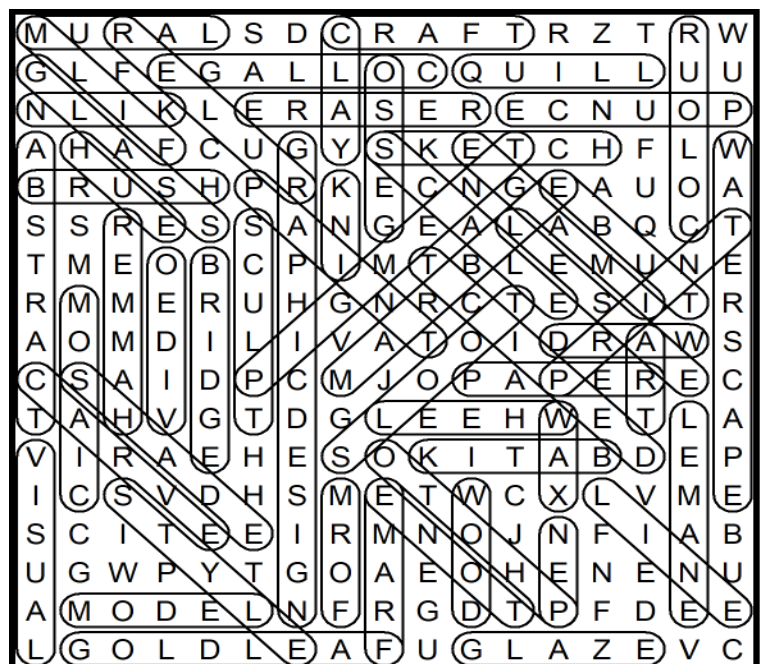

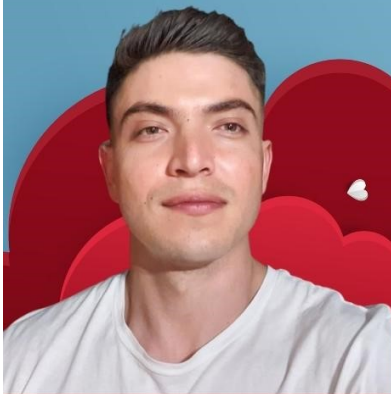
