How Is Easter Determined?

Coriander or cilantro or Chinese parsley or dhania (a term used by the Malay people in SA), is a tasty herb to most, a combination of flavours reminiscent of citrus and parsley. One study noted a very specific genetic component in a group of olfactory-receptor genes that causes them to strongly perceive the aldehydes in the leaves. Oh what a night?

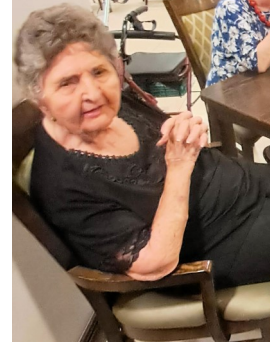

Little do they know!

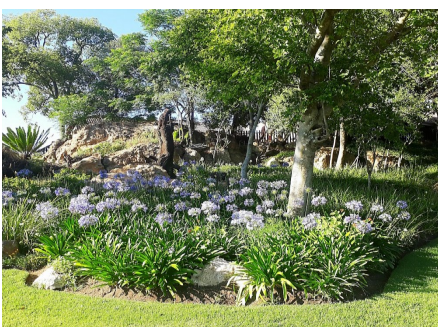
First thing in the morning, often while it is still dark there is the first exodus of residents who still do a full time job and need to be at their desks in Pretoria or

BLUE ICE

The ice cubes that you make in your freezer usually have a white centre because air in the water is trapped inside the ice cube when it freezes, giving it the white appearance. The air trapped between the ice crystals in snow also makes it appear white.

Not all glaciers produce blue ice. Large ice sheets such as found in Antarctica and Greenland, and smaller icecaps such as the Vatnajökull ice cap in Iceland and those in Scandinavia, the Russia arctic, Himalayas and New Zealand's South Island, can produce blue ice. Alpine glaciers are ice rivers and they do not produce blue ice.


Blue ice is formed at the bottom of glacial snowfields when the snow is compacted into ice. Under the weight of

many snowfalls over centuries, all the air in the ice below is eventually forced out and the ice becomes very dense. This ice has a blue colour as light penetrates deep into the ice before the red colour is absorbed and the light is then reflected and refracted out, appearing as a visible bluish tint. A glacier very slowly glides down the valley and at its terminal or front edge, the blue ice is finally exposed, as you can see on the photo of the Sólheimajökull glacier in Iceland. When the glacier calves, the blue ice becomes blue icebergs. Both Iceland and Greenland have some spectacular blue icebergs. Sadly, due to global warming, the Sólheimajökull glacier has drastically retreated in the past 30 years forming a 70 meter glacial lake as indicated on the second photo. Many years ago, on a trip to the Andes, we poked our ice axes into the snow on the glacier, and the hole had a blue hue, and so did the crevasses if you were brave enough to look down

into one. But that was not real blue ice.

Blue ice is quite amazing. It does not melt when exposed to light or in the water. Apparently, it is popular in New York bars as it keeps the whisky cold for longer, but at an exorbitant price.

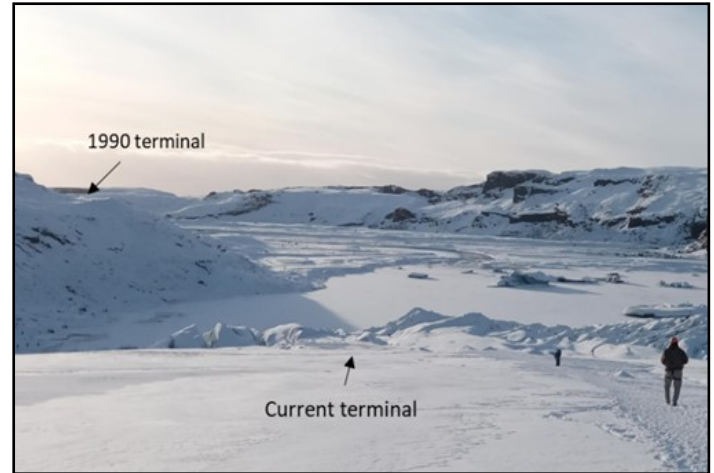

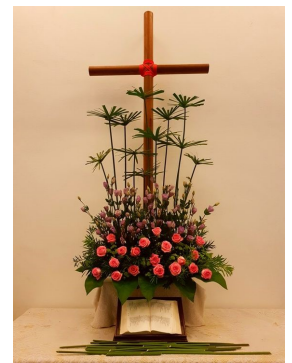

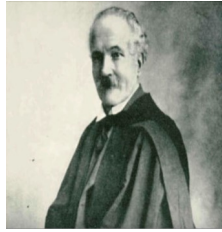
“Die slim man ken al die paaie, die wyse man ken die regte pad.”

C.J. Langenhoven
(1873-1932)

Cornelis Jacob Langenhoven was 'n regsgeleerde, koerantredakteur en Afrikaanse skrywer, digter en dramaturg. Hy het as skrywernaam C.J. Langenhoven en Sagmoedige Neelsie gebruik. Sy rol in die Afrikaanse literatuur en kultuurgeskiedenis was formidabel.

As Volksraadslid en senator speel hy 'n groot rol in die erkenning van Afrikaans as amptelike landstaal.

Die woorde van 'Die Stem' is in 1918 deur C.J. Langenhoven geskryf, en is in 1957 as die amptelike nasionale volkslied verklaar.

Cornelius Pannevis - Baanbreker

Arnoldus Pannevis was een van die baanbrekers van die Afrikaanse taal. Hy kan met reg die vader van die Eerste Taalbeweging genoem word. Nie alleen het hy op die toekomstige leiers 'n groot invloed uitgeoefen nie, maar deur sy briewe oor die Bybel in Afrikaans, dié van 1872 en weer van 1874, is die voorstanders van die skryf van Afrikaans bymekaargebring en dit lei tot die stigting van die Genootskap van Regte Afrikaners.[1]

Pannevis is in 1838 in Ouderkerk aan den IJssel in Nederland gebore en begin sy loopbaan in die Nederlandse Vloot, maar het dit laat vaar om vir predikant te leer weens swak gesondheid. Toe hy van die geleentheid in Suid-Afrika te hore kom,

het hy daarheen geëmigreer en kom op 11 Julie 1866 in Kaapstad aan om die pos van onderwyser in Latyn en Grieks aan die Paarlse Gimnasium te aanvaar. Hier was een van die grondleggers van die Afrikaanse taal, (die latere ds.) S.J. du Toit, een van sy leerlinge.

Pannevis was goed onderlê in Nederlands, Grieks, Latyn, Engels, Frans en Duits, met 'n redelike kennis van Italiaans, Spaans, Deens en Sweeds.

Pannevis het weldra begin belangstel in wat toe as "Die Taal" bekendgestaan het en publiseer in 1872 sy pleidooi om die vertaling van die Bybel in Afrikaans. Sy brief in De Zuid-Afrikaan het drie jaar later gelei tot die stigting van die Genootskap van Regte

Afrikaners, wat die beweging begin het vir die erkenning van Afrikaans as 'n volwaardige taal.

Hy het hierna self in Afrikaans begin skryf en is op 14 Augustus 1884 oorlede.

KLEINTYD-VAKANSIES

Stadsmens wat ek is, is van die lekkerste vakansies wat ek van toentertyd onthou, dié wat ons in die bosveld deurgebring het.

My ouers se vriend het 'n onbewerkte plaas langs die Limpoporivier op die grens tussen Suid-Afrika en die destydse Rhodesië gehad, waar 'n stuk grond langs die rivier skoongemaak is as kampplek. (Dit was vir my as kind onbegryplik dat mens net oor die rivier kon stap, en dan's jy in 'n ander land!)

So het dit dan gekom dat ons op 'n dag pad gevat het plaas toe. Ek wonder vandag nog hoe Pa, Ma, kinders, tent en boonop kosvoorraad, als in net één motor gepas het. Aan die motor is dan 'n seilsakkie vasgemaak, spesiaal vervaardig vir die doel om water koud te hou. Dit was natuurlik in die dae voordat die vakuumples in algemene gebruik was en ek onthou dat die seilsakkie doeltreffend was, maar dat dit die water 'n effe vreemde smaak gegee het.

Na ure se ry, meestal op swak stofpaaie, het ons laatmiddag by die kampplek aangekom. Pa stel toe voor ons pak net vining uit sodat ons betyds by die watergat kon aankom waar die wild vergader. Dis ongelooflik hoeveel verskillende, en hoe baie, wild daar destyds te sien was. Ek was maar klein, maar onthou olifante, kameelperde en natuurlik 'n groot verskeidenheid bokke.

Aapstreke

Toe terug kamp toe waar ons begroet is met die komieklikste gesig nog! 'n Spul nuuskierige apies het kom ondersoek instel om te kyk wat daar te ete is (en natuurlik wat gesteel kon word). Toe ons dus onverwags om die draai aangery kom, was daar groot konsternasie en met 'n geraas en geskreeu is hulle blitsvinnig terug bos toe.

Ongelukkig was die een ou kleintjie te stadig, en het hy inderhaas uit 'n sak probeer klim; van kop tot tone spierwit van mieliemeel, sy gesiggie vol eiergeel wat van hom afdrup. Daar was natuurlik verdere konsternasie toe hy ook al skreeuend terug is bos toe, met die res van die apies wat gil van skrik vir hierdie snaakse gedoente! Ons kon natuurlik nie ophou lag nie, alhoewel dit beteken het dat daar min van die eiers te redde was wat Ma so sorgvuldig in die mieliemeel verpak het, en dat die mieliemeel ook onbruikbaar was.

Nag in die bosveld

Een van die plaaswerkers (en nie-amptelike gids) het saans kamp toe gekom om vuur te maak. Afgesien daarvan dat dit vir kosvoorbereiding nodig was, was die vuur ook vir veiligheidsdoeleindes. Dit moes die hele nag brand - en hoog brand - om wilde diere, spesifiek leeus, weg te hou.

Ek wou nie saam met die ander in tente slaap nie, maar het verkies om saam met Pa naby die vuur onder 'n boom te slaap. Daar het ons dan lê en kyk na die hemelruim met Pa wat die verskillende konstellasies uitwys en jakkals-en-wolfstories vertel, tot die geknetter van die vuur, die veraf gebrul van leeus en ander vreemde naggeluide, Klaas Vakie die oorhand laat kry het.

'n Olifant van naby – of nie?

Vroegoggend is daar in die kabbelende water van die Limpoporivier gewas, en ook tande geborsel. Die rivier was nogal vlak en so helder skoon dat mens die bodem kon sien.

My broer was 9 jaar ouer as ek en het op 14 jaar gedink hy's vreeslik dapper. Hy torring toe aan die gids om hom 'n olifant van nader te wys. Die twee is vroeg daar weg, met die gids voor en Boetie agterna. Kort voor lank hoor ons net die geklap van voete, en daar kom brawe meneer volspoed aangehardloop, bleek van die skrik en heeltemal uitasem. Hy's gevolg deur die gids wat so lekker lag dat hy skaars kon praat. Hy't vertel dat toe hulle binne kort afstand op 'n olifant afgekom het, beduie hy met die hand vir my broer om nader te kom, en fluister, "Kyk nou mooi, hier's die olifant". Maar toe hy omkyk, sien hy net stof staan soos boetie spore maak! Hierdie storie is natuurlik tuis met lus, en vir baie jare daarna nog, oorvertel. Nodeloos om te sê, het Boetie hom dan weereens vinnig uit die voete gemaak.

Soete herinneringe

Geen vyfster-vakansie, met al die weelde wat mens kan begeer, sal ooit dieselfde bekoring vir my inhou as hierdie eenvoudige kindertyd-vakansies in die bos nie. Die vreemde dog magiese naggeluide, die pikswart nag met net die vuur se vlamme as enigste lig, en die sterre wat helder teen die hemelruim skitter, sal my altyd bybly.

NITROGEN IN TYRES FOR IMPROVED ROAD SAFETY

Nitrogen constitutes 78% of the air we breathe and oxygen only makes up 21%. (Air also has small amounts of other gases, such as carbon dioxide, neon and hydrogen, making up the additional 1%.)

In its purest form, nitrogen gas is:

- non-flammable
- non-combustible
- non-corrosive and environmentally safe.

In contrast to air, nitrogen tyre gas does not attack or oxidise the rubber of the tyre from the inside. Since it is a pure gas, tyres run cooler because they do not retain heat.

Nitrogen and Safety

It is apparent from the facts and available data that nitrogen tyre inflation is better than air tyre inflation. There are strong arguments in support of better road handling and up to 20% longer tyre life.

Under-inflation, overloading and

poor conditions are the top three reasons for blow-outs. However, under-inflation is something we can combat. Utilising nitrogen to fill tyres may be the solution.

Water vapour absorbs and holds heat, and when it changes from liquid to vapour, the water expands in volume. So, tyres inflated with wet air tend to run hotter and the pressure fluctuates more. Since pure nitrogen is dry, there is very little water vapour.

Availability and Affordability

For a long time, nitrogen inflation of tyres has been a common procedure for tyres used on race cars like Formula One, as well as aircraft, trucks and vehicles utilised in mining and other industrial applications. Nitrogen is also used in the tyres of Tour de France bicycles, all of the space shuttles and even the tyres on the moon buggies!

Until recently, South Africa did not have a widespread practise of nitrogen tyre inflation, mostly due to the procedure's high cost. Today's machines, like those found at tyre dealers, produce and store enough nitrogen to make nitrogen tyre inflation for regular cars and trucks affordable.

Converting to nitrogen is easy – existing air in the tyres is removed and the tyres are then inflated with compressed, pure nitrogen at a once-off fee per tyre. For advantages to be maintained, subsequent nitrogen top-ups are necessary. The good news is top-ups are free and available at most tyre shops.

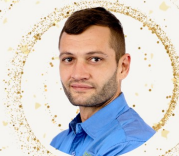
