SECOND PHASE HOUSES REQUIRING RISING DAMP REPAIR

The plan for 2024

1.RISING DAMP REPAIR

The program that was started in 2023 to repair Rising Damp will now continue into 2024.

This year, we are planning to start the damp repair on the remaining 54 houses. It needs to be noted that these remaining 54 houses were scheduled for this year due to budget restraints as well as the nature of the damp identified. This was not as severe as what was repaired in 2023. Not all walls are affected with the rising damp. We need to stress this point so that you do not become concerned when you realise that not all walls will be repaired. These houses have been thoroughly inspected by our contractor (DampOut) to identify which walls need repairing.

The houses on the schedule are as follows:

The contractor has been appointed to do this work. We will inform you of the program as accurately as we can. We are hoping to commence at the beginning of March.

Painting will commence +-6 weeks after the rising damp has been repaired.

Please note that the painting regime is

based on two primer coats and two final coats to match the existing colour in the Village. The final coats will be a good quality PVA paint. The first three coats will cover the repaired area only and the final (fourth) coat will cover the entire window and/or door surrounds to ensure that everything matches. This process, for each house, will take a few days as the different coats need to dry before the next is applied. The walls that have not been repaired will only have a single coat of the final PVA to ensure that the colour is matched throughout the house. Minor repairs e.g. crack filling will be done where necessary.

Please keep an eye on the progress made on adjacent houses to provide an indicator of when yours will be due. Once again, all work will be external and those residents affected are requested to provide clear access to the painting contractor's staff.

Please remove all furniture, pot plants, irrigation piping etc that will interfere with the repair of the plaster surrounding the affected windows and doors (including the garage).

We thank you all for your patience and understanding during this disruptive, but essential repair process. The end result will certainly be worth all the inconvenience.

PAINTING THOSE HOUSES THAT DO NOT REQUIRE RISING DAMP REPAIR

There are houses in the Village that do not

require rising damp repairs. These houses are listed below and fall under the 10-year maintenance plan and are due for repainting. This takes place in early 2024. In total there are 86 houses that fall into this category. The intention here is to do whatever minor maintenance is required to fill small surface cracks and blemishes etc and then to do a complete repaint of all plastered surfaces. The paint on many of these houses has faded slightly and with the repaint, all houses in the Village will match. These houses will only require a single roll over of the final coat. Some areas may require a second coat but these will be the exception.

The following is an email that was circulated by Martin Lockwood, Chairman of the Board.

This past weekend has been a most stressful one for many of us.

Firstly, the major water leak outside the Olivedale Hospital meant that from midday Thursday we had no water in the village. This continued for the whole weekend. With the heat we have been experiencing, the situation was made worse.

Internal gement team were not on site of Friday. The Board will try and address this issue as soon as possible.

However, what was unexpected was that many residents were unaware of the location of the JoJo emergency tanks even though this has been

Secondly, the change over to the new telephone service provider has proven to be somewhat of a nightmare as it has not gone according to schedule with many phones still not working as they should.

And finally, all this took place when our management company had their planned annual staff lunch on Friday when we had no water and a faulty phone system.

On the first point we had no control and as the event unfolded, we were left in the dark with poor predictions and reports from Johannesburg Water.

We were unable to communicate the limited information we had as the management team were not on site on Friday. The Board will try and address this issue as soon as possible.

However, what was unexpected was that many residents were unaware of the location of the JoJo emergency tanks even though this has been communicated regularly and the latest Olive Branch covered a full front-page article on the newest tank located at the entrance of the 500-apartment block. In addition, residents have been advised to carry emergency water supplies in case we are ever faced with a no water position. These advisories have been ignored by many.

On the second point, we will be taking the lack of telephone services up with the new service provider. We will endeavour to get this issue resolved ASAP.

Finally, we will have discussions with

Trafalgar to see what can be put in place to ensure that we do not have a repeat of this situation in the future.

However, with all of this going on, when our receptionist Liezel Nel came on duty on Saturday morning she was faced with rudeness and verbal abuse from many of our residents and this type of behaviour is completely unacceptable. As a result, Liezel was left in tears on more than one occasion while she was doing her best to remain polite and calm. I realise that there was frustration caused by a combination of the three events mentioned above but to take this out on Liezel who had nothing to do with these events was exceptionally rude. I sincerely hope that these residents, and I must stress it was not everyone, take time to reflect on their unacceptable behaviour and go and apologise to Liezel.

The Board and I sincerely hope that this does not happen again.

NATURE IN FULL SWING IN THE GARDEN OF REMEMBRANCE

The miracle, tragedy, and compassion of nature

garden to garden, while always keeping a wary eye on me. I am not a birder, but this behaviour made me think that I first noticed this when I spotted a nest the chicks were hers. In subsequent days, I often saw the Cape Robin sitting in a tree near the nest and chirping at the chicks.

One of the chicks was dominating its sibling by blocking it whenever a meal was being served. It demonstrated a strong determination that any food on offer was not going to be shared.


Not long after that, the surviving chick had transformed into what was really starting to look like a bird. There was no longer any sign of the sibling.



The next day the nest was empty. What looked like a chick still very dependent on its parent the previous day had now left the nest for good.



The good news is that I spotted the newly hatched youngster in one of the gardens and managed to take a picture of him/her. Hardly able to fly properly, it managed to skim in short bursts about half a meter above ground. It could run really fast and certainly looked fat and healthy and ready to start



its life in the wild.

Maybe I have an overly active imagination, but this looks like it could be the partly mummified corpse of the sibling that did not make it. Something looks very much like a beak to me, but maybe you also need to let your imagination run wild! If it is the dead sibling, it sure shows the compassion of the parent in not just discarding the corpse of its child but giving it a decent "burial". No matter whether my interpretations are correct or not, this is a wonderful example of the many aspects of nature:

WORLD WETLANDS DAY 2024

World Wetlands Day is celebrated every year on 2 February to mark the day on which the Convention on Wetlands was adopted back in 1971 in Ramsar, Iran. A different theme is addressed each year and this year the theme is "2024: Wetlands and Human Wellbeing". This theme is particularly relevant to ORV's development of the open space on Erf 1250 and Erf 1248 north of the electric fence as a recreational area for the villagers to enjoy.

Now that the dam wall and spillway have been completed, we can hopefully fill the dam in the remaining rainy months. Once we know where the water will pond, we can start looking at what rehabilitation and revegetation is appropriate. Unfortunately, much of what currently grows in the wetland is alien and some

invasive too. A member of the WWC picked six small wild flowers in the wetland with great excitement only to discover that none of them were identified as indigenous. Though the task of revegetation may be enormous, much can be achieved by continuing to tackle small areas at a time to eventually create an indigenous wetland where only invasive scrub existed before. What a contribution for ORV to make to wetland conservation.

Researchers at the University of California Davis, examined the effect on people of looking at open water. They found that it may well be good for lovely natural environment. one. Some study participants' heart rates slowed, and their blood pressure lowered when they were looking at water rather than at a parking lot or the adjacent ground. Though the effects of looking at water is

temporary, it does relax one. Once the dam is filled, ORV residents will have their own body of open water to look at to get relief from stress for a while, and if you are lucky, you may spot a bird or two as well.


The first two projects to provide recreational facilities for residents of our village in the open space should start early in the new financial year when the funds become available. This development will make the wetland and surrounding grassland accessible for all to enjoy and to come and relieve some stress by looking at water in a







THE ORV RECYCLING INITIATIVE

As you may have heard via the grapevine, a recycling project at our Olivedale Village has been in the planning stages for well over a year. At long last we can bring you the good news that the first step in this project is now up and running, and we need your help and interest to make it function in the best possible way.

The Village now has its own "Bottle Bank" for the collection of glass bottles. This is situated in the rubbish yard next to the Garden of Remembrance. It is a large green container with a smallish hole at the top through which the bottles can be thrown into the container. When it is full, this container Any glass bottles can now be put out will be collected and a replacement left for the normal rubbish collection in in the yard. The Village will receive payment for the weight collected.

Recycling companies know there are

rules for whatever we want them to collect. With these Glass Banks, the items to be thrown inside are ONLY glass bottles - not plastic at all please, and no tops on the wine bottle, the coffee bottle or the chutney, tomato sauce or mayo bottles. Please just "rinse and recycle". Also avoid tossing in any broken tumblers or wine glasses, window glass or mirrors. If these items are found inside, the whole consignment is discarded. There is an official notice on the Bottle Bank about this and we ask for your help to stick to their rules.




RAILWAY JACK: THE TRUE STORY OF AN AMAZING BABOON


